Hello everyone,

As we move into March we have a lot going on in the Monticello Community School District. If we can avoid the weather a little more we can still end the school year before the Great Jones County Fair begins in July! Up to this point we do have 5 snow days but since we are a school district that goes by hours and not days some of those days can be waived. The school board will decide that in April when the majority of the weather has passed for the school year. Until then, keep your fingers crossed for better weather.

We will be about half way through the second semester as we get to Spring Break. When we return from Spring Break we will have the state standardized tests (ISASP Tests) at the beginning of April. We are hoping to get the results of these tests back by the beginning of the summer and mail them home. Please take some time to review the importance of, "doing your best" with your child before they take these tests in April. Especially with the older students, sometimes they do not understand the importance of these tests because they do not directly impact their grades. The ISASP tests do give us information on the academic progress of each student and we use this information as a staff to determine classroom placements, effective resources, and the perfection of the best instructional practices for our students. These results are also good for parents because they show each student's proficiency, in each area tested, in an easy to understand format.

The boys' basketball team qualified for the state basketball tournament for the fourth year in a row! We also had state qualifiers in bowling and wrestling. In addition, we had group speech participants qualify for all-state honors. Also coming up this spring is the school play. This spring they will be doing the play, "Clue". That should be a great production and fun for the performers.

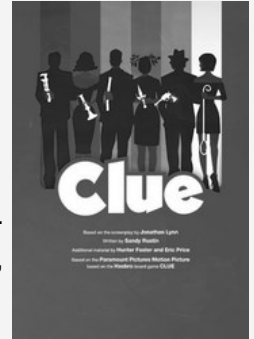


Weather Make-Up Days

KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION

Kindergarten Registration is for students entering Kindergarten in the fall of 2023 is now open! At this time parents will be asked to use the electronic registration form to create their student in Infinite Campus: [23-24 New Student Online Registration](#). This form is located on the school website: <https://www.monticello.k12.ia.us/>. Go to Schools>Shannon Elementary>Downloads>Kindergarten/New student letter, online registration form, and mandatory forms.

Completed immunizations and a dental exam are required by law for all students entering Kindergarten. Some of the series of vaccines take six (6) months to complete. Start now to make sure all needed immunizations are completed before your child starts school in the fall of 2023. Print off these additional forms and present them to Sandy Hinrichs, Shannon Elementary School Secretary.

Forms included: IDPH Dental Screen, IDPH Vision Screen, Iowan Migrant Parents Form (everyone must fill out), Home Language Survey, and physical form. These forms are located in the downloads folder on our [website](#) under Shannon School.

There are some items that you will need to download, fill out and turn into Shannon Elementary by the time your child starts school. SOPHOMORES & JUNIORS—National Honor Society applications are available in the office. Any sophomore or junior with at least a 3.5 cumulative GPA and 40 hours of community service is welcome to apply. Applications are due in the office by **March 10 at 3:15 pm**, with no exceptions.

Summer Driver's Education

Monticello High School will offer one session of summer driver's education. An informational letter and registration form is available in the middle school and high school offices. Space may be limited. Applications will be considered on a first come, first served basis. Return the registration form to the High School Office by Friday, March 3, 2023. The cost is \$320.

The summer session is scheduled to start approximately Monday, May 29, 2023 and will conclude approximately Friday, June 30, 2023. Both the start and end dates may be adjusted if there is a change to the school calendar due to adverse winter weather. The class will be done online. There will be a student/parent meeting in May to sign up for the online class and schedule driving times. Students must have a permit to be enrolled in the class.

Homeless Youth

The Monticello School District Homeless Youth Coordinator is **Denny Folken, Elementary Principal**. **Homeless Coordinator Duties:**

- Locate and identify homeless children or youth within the district, whether or not they are enrolled in school **281—IAC 33.3(1)**
- Provide evidence the definition of “homeless” is communicated in staff, parent, and student documents (e.g., newsletters and handbooks) **(HCY4)**
- Post information, at community shelters and other locations in the district where services or assistance is provided to the homeless, regarding the educational rights of homeless children and youth and encouraging homeless children and youth to enroll in the public school **(HCY2). 281—IAC 33.3(2)**

Definition of Homeless Youth:

If a student is living in any of the following situations, it is considered to be a homeless situation.

In a shelter, motel, vehicle, or campground; on the street; in an abandoned building, trailer, or other inadequate accommodations, or doubled up with friends or relatives because you cannot find or afford housing,

McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Act (as it appears in Monticello Schools parent and student handbooks)

Homeless children have the right to:

- Go to school, no matter where you live or how long you have lived there.
- Continue in the school they attended before you became homeless or the school they last attended, if that is your choice and is feasible.
- Receive transportation to the school they attended before your family became homeless or the school they last attended if you or a guardian requests such transportation.
- Attend a school and participate in school programs with children who are not homeless.
- Enroll in school without giving a permanent address.
- Enroll and attend classes while the school arranges for the transfer of school and immunization records or any other documents required for enrollment.
- Enroll and attend classes in the school of your choice even while the school and you seek to resolve a dispute over enrolling your children.
- Receive the same special programs and services, if needed, as provided to all other children served in these programs.
- Receive transportation to school and to school programs. When you move, you should do the following:
Contact the school district’s local liaison for homeless education (Denny Folken, Shannon and Carpenter School Elementary Principal 319-465-3000) for help in enrolling your child in a new school or arranging for your child to continue in his or her former school. (Or someone at a shelter, social services office, or the school can direct you to the person you need to contact.) Contact the school and provide any information you think will assist the teachers in helping your child adjust to new circumstances. Ask the local liaison for homeless education, the shelter provider, or a social worker for assistance with clothing and supplies, if needed.

Notice of Nondiscrimination

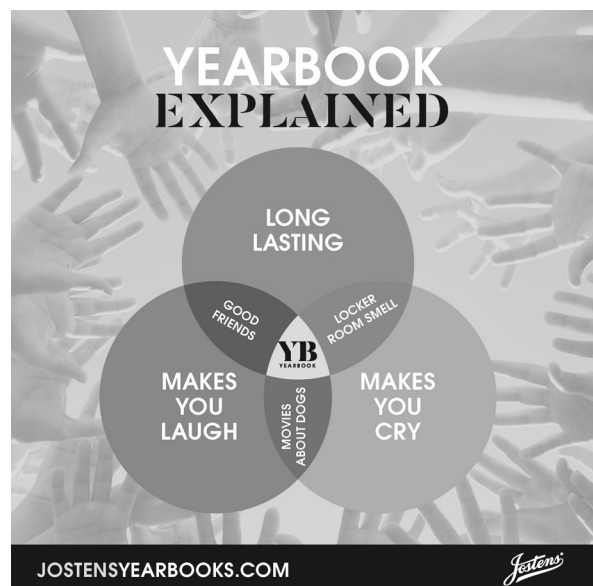
